#### 7. Admission procedure

- ① Applications submitted by overseas Koreans are to be reviewed by overseas diplomatic missions, which are to recommend candidates to NIIED.
- ② President of NIIED is to notify a list of names of those selected from among the applicants recommended by overseas diplomatic missions to President of Kongju National University and the organizations that recommended those applicants.
- ③ President of Kongju National University notifies admission for applicants and sends a letter of invitation (or standard admission letter) for selected applicants to relevant chiefs of diplomatic missions.
- ④ President of Kongju National University provides those participants admitted to the curriculum with services needed for their actual enrollment such as support for their entry into the country, registration, and dorm room assignment.

#### 8. Other

- In case details included in application and other required documents are found at variance with the facts, admission and course completion may be cancelled not only during enrollment but also after completion of the course.
- For provision of financial aids, academic performance, attendance, general comportment, and financial status of family will be considered.



## Admission Screening

Admission for overseas Korean nationals

- Maximum 2% of the admission quota for applicants with Korean nationality.
- Overseas Korean nationals who have completed regular domestic or international educational curriculum in elementary, middle, and high school.
- Students whose parents are Koreans living abroad, Korean government employees on duty abroad, are employed by foreign government or international organizations, or are employees dispatched abroad by Korean companies.

Admission for foreigners

- Foreign students who have foreign nationality (the student alone has foreign nationality).
- Foreign students whose parents are foreigners.
- Foreigners who have completed the entire education curriculum (elementary, middle, and high school).

Admission for students who have completed the entire educational curriculum abroad

- Foreign student who have acquired foreign nationality (the student alone has foreign nationality).
- Foreign students whose parents are foreigners.
- Foreigners who have completed the entire education curriculum (elementary, middle, and high school).

## Documents to be Prepared

#### · Required Documents

- Application form prescribed form specific university.
- Certificate for (prospective) graduation from high school.
- Schooling records from elementary, middle and high school attended by the applicant.
- Certificate of entry into and exit from the country (for parents and the student).

## Additional Documents (to be prepared in accordance with desired university and admission category)

- Certificate of cancellation of resident registration (copy of family register or deleted family register).
- Copy of permanent residence card (for parents and the student).
- Overseas Korean nationals registration certificate (for parents and the student).
- Guardian's certificate of employment (specifying the period for employment in foreign country).
- ETC.

### · Precautions for Preparation of Documents

- For overseas Korean nationals and foreigners admission, the applicant must prepare documents required for admission (absence of any of the documents may disqualify submission).
- Since different universities require different documents, an applicant must check on that in advance.
- Submitted documents must be provided in Korean or English (Documents

- provided in foreign languages other than English have to be translated and notarized).
- A diploma or transcripts require an Apostille or must be certified by a Republic of Korea consul. And some Chinese universities may require accreditation from the Chinese government (Reference <a href="http://www.cdgdc.edu.cn/">http://www.cdgdc.edu.cn/</a>).

### Admission to Graduate School

- Graduate school admission takes the same process and method as college admission does, but with slight differences as to required documents (university graduation certificate and grade transcripts required).
- A letter of recommendation required from a faculty member from the attended school (using the relevant form available from a specific university).
- As graduate schools require different admission procedures and documents, applicants are advised to check in advance.

#### Other Information

#### Other Information

- An applicant needs to spend some time choosing his or her university and major area of study.
- An applicant may apply to as many universities as the person wants to.
- Application fee: between 60,000 and 200,000 won.
- All documents submitted should be original copies.
   (When a student applies to a plural number of universities, he or she may get to submit a photocopy of a specific document, which best be notarized in the relevant country. Some universities require check with the original document.)
- Details admission information is available from the Admissions page for each university.

#### **X** Apostille Convention

- It is a multi-party convention that provides for legalization of official documents by their issuing states while abolishing complex certification procedure by consuls serving at diplomatic missions abroad, with the purpose of facilitating mutual certification of the documents among signatory countries.
- Full name: Convention Abolishing the Requirement of Legalization for Foreign Public Document
- Signatory states: 92 countries including the US, Japan, Argentina, and Russia.
- Competent authorities: authorities designated by the government of a state.

## FAQ on Dormitory Life

- How many people share a dormitory room, and does it have a bathroom and a shower?
- A. A dormitory room is double occupancy and has a bathroom, which includes a shower in it.
- Is there a convenience store nearby? If not, where can residents find one?
- A 24/7 convenience store is 5 to 7 minutes' walk from the campus. A couple of minutes' walk from there will take you to two mega stores.
- What facilities are there around the dormitory? \*Like cafè, shop, snack bar etc.
- A. Convenience store: a 24/7 shop at 5 to 7 minutes' walk from the dorm.

Mega stores: 5 to 7 minutes' walk away.

Restaurants: Korean food restaurants, warm noodle eatery, cafeteria and snack bar, Chinese restaurant etc.

Bank: NH Nonghyup is 7 to 10 minutes' walk from the dorm.

Hospital: Seongbo Hospital at 7 to 10 minutes' walk.

## Is Daejeon the largest city that is closest to the campus? How does one get here there?

A. Yes, Daejeon is the closest city, and Daejeon-bound express bus is always ready to take you there from the terminal.

With the first bus at 6:50, Daejeon-bound bus starts out every thirty minutes, and it takes 50 minutes to 1 hour between Gongju and Daejeon at a fare of 3,500 won.

Yuseong, before you end up in Daejeon, is a business center. Between Gongju and Yuseong, it takes some 30 minutes, bus leaving every quarter of an hour. The fare is 3,500 won.

## • How long does it take from Gongju to Seoul? How does one get to the capital?

A. From Gongju Bus Terminal, you take an express bus for Gangnam Express Bus Terminal, Nambu Bus Terminal, and Dong Seoul Express Bus Terminal. It takes an hour and half and costs some 8,600 won.

## Q Is there a computer for participants' use?

A. The computer lab at the dormitory has ten computers, all of which can be used. Also, 4F of Overseas Koreans Education Center has a computer lab, which has some 20 computers available for program participants' use.

## Q. How can one get to Overseas Koreans Education Center?

A. From Gongju Bus Terminal, walk to a nearby city bus stop, and get on Bus No. 125 and get off for a grocery store at the main gate for Okryong Campus of Kongju National University. When you take a taxi, just say to the driver, "Gongju daehakkyo Okryong campus ro gajuseyo ('Okryong Campus of Kongju National University')".

### Q. How many washing machines are available?

## Q. Is there a key to a dorm room?

A. A keycard, which is required to open the main door of the dormitory and a participant's room door will be provided to each participant.

## Q How many electrical outlets are in a dorm room?

A There are four electrical outlets in a room, with one each on both sides of a bed, and a couple of them in the bathroom.

As the local voltage is 220V, a program participant must bring a voltage converter from 220V for his or her use.

### Q. Does the dormitory have staff?

A Residence Director lives in the dorm, and since dormitory employee works in Administration Office from 9 a.m to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday, resident grievances can be handled at Administration Office as well.

#### Is medical insurance available?

All students participating in Educational Curriculum for Overseas Koreans Studying in homeland are covered international student insurance provided by the University. Those students who get to visit a hospital during the course can get a refund of about 20–30% of the premium through a review by the insurance company, which requires submission of specified documents.

- Policy period: as long as the training lasts.

#### ■ Required documents

- Diagnosis (general, first-time medical record), receipt for medical charge, prescription for medication, bank passbook and a copy of identification.

#### ■ Medical charge (daily deductable)

If a medical charge stays within the specified amount, no insurance claim is available.

## Where can one get Korean language textbook?

A Textbooks are freely provided to students who join Educational Curriculum for Overseas Koreans Studying in homeland, and the textbooks are to be created and produced by Institute of Korean Education & Culture. # Q. What level of TOPIK is required for a participant to follow a class?

A. Through a diagnostic test, students may find their appropriate class, differentiating from those who don't have an inkling of the Korean alphabet to those who are pretty fluent learners. Therefore, a student's current Korean skills wouldn't matter, while passion should suffice.

# Q. Can a program participant sleep over in Seoul on weekend?

- A. Students may use the dormitory of National Institute for International Education (NIIED), which supervises the program. It may be used only as long as a course lasts and lodging charge is up to the user.
